Yurok Indian Housing Authority

- Authorizing resolution <u>95-33</u>, creating the <u>Yurok Indian housing</u> <u>authority</u> (YIHA), approved by Tribal Council on February 9, 1995
- YIHA was appointed as the <u>Tribally Designated housing entity</u> (<u>TDHE</u>) tribal resolution <u>97-155</u> in October of 1997.
- Currently governed by the <u>Yurok</u>
 <u>Indian Housing Authority</u>
 <u>Ordinance passed in 2015.</u>

Yurok Indian Housing Authority

- ► The YIHA Mission is:
 - To provide affordable, safe, decent housing to lower-income tribal members.
 - Service Area: Del Norte and Humboldt COUNTIES: ancestral boundary

- Board of Commissioners meetings:
 - Second Tuesday of Every month

Yurok Indian Housing Authority: Programs

- Current types of assistance
 - Low-Income Rental assistance (multifamily apartments, Elder units, & single family homes)
 - Elder Emergency Assistance
 - Down Payment Assistance
 - New Construction/Rehab
 - Student rentals/vouchers
 - Home ownership (limited basis)

- Multifamily low-income Rental units:
 - Chance lane- Mckinleyville
 - Maiden lane- Crescent City
 - We-roy Tulley Creek
 - Union Green- Eureka
 - Students Only
 - Trinity River Elder Village-Hoopa
 - Elders only
 - Butte/Cooper- Crescent City
 - Elders only

March 18th 2020, YIHA staff Entered Emergency Response to Covid-19

- ▶ Board of Commissioners called an emergency meeting to suspend all rental and mortgage payments by Tribal members.
- Staff were asked to remain home until remote work stations could be set up
- All work stopped in tribal members homes unless the work was essential to sheltering in place

- YIHA followed and participated in the Tribes Emergency Operations protocol
- Development projects were suspended until further notice in cases that required tribal members to leave their homes while the work was being completed
- Staff were instructed to remain a social distance and wear masks moving forward

HUD CARES Funding: \$1,395,000

- HUD Announced CARES Funds for Indian Housing Block Grant Funds
- YIHA submitted a CARES Indian Housing Plan for the funds:
 - Allowable Expenditures
 - Approved by HUD

- Planned Expenditures:
 - Two Months of Utility Payments
 - Two Months of Loan Payments
 - Water System Improvements to ensure water to homes during shelter in place
 - Office Upgrades to work from home;
 - Infrastructure upgrades to work from home on the Cloud
 - Elder Emergency Assistance funds and Elder Supply boxes (sent out in May)
 - Infrastructure plans for Emergency Housing

What Else has the YIHA done during Covid-19 for Tribal Members?

- Board of Commissioners suspended all evictions for four months;
- Board of Commissioners suspended home inspections
- Employment verifications have been suspended during recertifications
- A Mailbox has been installed outside the Klamath office to submit paperwork without staff present;
- Intercom installed at the Klamath office from outside so Tribal Members can buzz staff;

- Elders have been assisted with Elder Emergency issues regardless of previous assistance
- Partnered with Arcata House Partnership and submitted the Homekey Application for homeless housing in Eureka; 25% of beds are reserved for homeless Yurok Tribal members;
- Collaborated with the Yurok Tribal Courts to open a Women's Re-entry house in Klamath so that tribal women completing recovery have a place to shelter.

Additional Relief: Emergency Rural Housing Funds

California Coalition for Rural Housing awarded the YIHA \$7500 for Emergency Rural Housing Assistance

Staff identified 25 elders, 70 and older in YIHA housing to supply with additional household goods. Elder Boxes included a bulk supply of the following:

Batteries, paper towels, toilet paper, Kleenex tissues, dish soap, laundry soap, body soap, Zip Lock bags, basic groceries, and a gift card for \$125.00

Yurok Indian Housing Authority: 2020 Expenses

- Annual Expenses Breakdown (approx. \$4.4 million)
 - **Construction and Programming: Woo-Mehl Tulley Creek: \$1,360,000
 - ► Maintenance Staff and Work Orders (trash and repairs) \$800,000
 - ▶ Loans payment \$940,000
 - Staff (Admin, fiscal, Program Operations)- \$1 million
 - ▶ Insurance (Property), Utilities, equipment- \$300,000
 - (** Unusual Year: Limited Programming while focusing on Woo Mehl (Tulley Creek); typically \$1.3 million would be entirely for elder home rehabilitation or placement, weatherization, and down payment assistance)







Yurok Indian Housing Authority: Up Next

- Complete the Woo-Mehl (Tulley Creek) Construction: The four plex, community center, community pavilion, and new home at McCoy
- Construction of the Arcata 30th St. Commons
 - 36 units: 8 Single Family Homes with Additional Dwelling Units, 4 multiplexes with five units each.
- Resume NAHASDA regular programming (with Covid-19 Protocols)
- Continuing to search for grant applications and additional opportunities for partnerships to improve services to Tribal Members
